NOTE FROM THE PASTOR:

Dear Parishioners:

Today is *Divine Mercy Sunday*. The word “mercy” comes from two Latin derivatives: “miseria” and “cor”. Miseria means weakness, poverty, helplessness. From this Latin word comes the English word: misery. Cor means heart, plain and simple. Therefore, the concept of mercy entails the heart of God—the Sacred Heart—reaching toward our weakness, poverty, helplessness, and, yes, our misery.

On August 18, 1996, Fr. Alejandro Pezet was finishing Mass in Buenos Aires. A woman came to tell him that she had found a discarded Host. Fr. Alejandro placed the defiled Host in a container of water and put it away in the tabernacle. The next week, upon opening the tabernacle, the priest was astonished to see that the Host had turned bloody. He informed Jorge Bergoglio (Auxiliary Bishop at that time, now Pope Francis), who gave instructions that the Host be professionally photographed. The photos were taken on September 6. They make clear that the Host had become a piece of bloody flesh, and had grown in size. For several years the Host remained in the tabernacle and the whole affair was kept secret. When Bergoglio became the cardinal archbishop of Buenos Aires he decided to have it scientifically analyzed.

On October 5, 1999, in the presence of the Cardinal’s representatives, Dr. Ricardo Castanon took a sample of the bloody Host and sent it to New York for analysis. He deliberately did not inform the team of scientists where it came from so as to have an objective investigation. One of these scientists was well-known cardiologist and forensic pathologist, Dr. Frederic Zugiba. He became scientifically convinced that the substance was real flesh and blood.

Zugiba testified that, “the analyzed material is a fragment of the heart muscle found in the wall of the left ventricle close to the valves. This muscle is responsible for the contraction of the heart. It should be borne in mind that the left cardiac ventricle pumps blood to all parts of the body. The heart muscle is in an inflammatory condition and contains a large number of white blood cells. This indicates that the heart was alive at the time the sample was taken. It is my contention that the heart was alive, since white blood cells die outside a living organism. They require a living organism to sustain them. Thus, their presence indicates that the heart was

alive when the sample was taken. What is more, these white blood cells had penetrated the tissue, which further indicates that the heart had been under severe stress, as if the owner had been beaten severely about the chest.”

The heart was alive! In the Eucharist the Sacred Heart of Jesus is given to us because of His Divine Mercy. That compassionate heart of our Savior reaches into our earthly struggle, which we bring to the Altar at every Mass, and brings light, healing and peace. The Saints knew the power and splendor of the Eucharist. Here are some quotes from our big brothers and sisters in the faith:

- When the Eucharist is being celebrated, the sanctuary is filled with countless angels who adore the divine Victim immolated on the Altar. [St. John Chrysostom]
- The angels surround and help the priest when he is celebrating Mass. [St. Augustine]
- If we really understood the Mass, we would die of joy. [Saint John Vianney]
- The celebration of Holy Mass is as valuable as the death of Jesus on the Cross. [Saint Thomas Aquinas]
- Once, St. Teresa was overwhelmed with God’s Goodness and asked Our Lord “How can I thank you?” Our Lord replied, “Attend one Mass.”
- It would be easier for the world to survive without the sun than to do without Holy Mass. [St. Pio of Pietrelcina]
