NOTE FROM THE PASTOR:

Dear Parishioners:

There once was a man who owned a small farm. He was not a rich man but he did own a prize thoroughbred horse. It was the most valuable material thing he had. One day the horse ran away. His neighbors came to console him. “We’re so sorry to hear of your bad news.” The man replied, “Good news, bad news. Who knows?” A week later the thoroughbred returned with 10 stallions. They were magnificent beasts that added greatly to his wealth. When his wife found out about it she rushed over to him excitedly and asked, “Isn’t this wonderful?” “Good news, bad news. Who knows?” he said. Then one day his son was riding one of the stallions in an attempt to train it. He was thrown and broke his leg. When the mailman heard about it he stopped over during his route and said that he was sorry to learn of the news. “Good news, bad news. Who knows?” Later on war broke out in the country and there was a draft. The farmer’s son was exempt.

Good news, bad news. There was good news recently for pro-life people like ourselves. Christians are, by the very nature of being Christian, pro-life. After all, how can a Christian be pro-abortion, pro-choice, pro-reproductive rights—however we call it? In other words, how can one be a lover of the God of life and love on the one hand, and support the ultimate act of hatred—the murder of the innocent—on the other hand? It’s a gross contradiction. Some would say, “I am personally opposed to abortion but I believe it should be a woman’s choice.” That is illogical. Why are you “personally opposed”? Because you know it is heinous and wrong. Can you say I am “personally opposed” to armed robbery—I would never do it—but I believe in the free choice of the bandit to do it?” Other Christians may say, “But abortion is not my problem. I have my own. I am too busy.” Edmund Burke answers, “All that is necessary for the triumph of evil is that good men do nothing.”

But I digress. There was good pro-life news recently. The Guttmacher Institute is a pro-abortion research group. It is considered to have the most comprehensive abortion numbers for the U.S. It recently reported that there were 926,200 abortions in 2014 and 958,700 in 2013. Those numbers are the lowest since 1975, two years after the U.S. Supreme Court ruled on *Roe v. Wade*, which legalized abortion on demand through all nine months of pregnancy. Fewer abortions! That’s good news! Praise the Lord!

The bad news is that abortion is still legal, and legal *for any reason whatsoever*, in this great nation of ours. I read an article about an abortion nurse who had an encounter with a well-to-do couple at the abortion clinic where she was working. They were a handsome, well-educated young married couple. The wife was into her second trimester, which meant that she was clearly pot-bellied. They explained that the pregnancy was actually a wanted pregnancy. They were initially very happy to learn that she was expecting. The nurse wrote, “Up until this point, most of the cases I had been privy to were our typical six- or seven-week-type situations such as ‘Whoops? I am pregnant and can’t possibly support a baby!’ or ‘I am only fourteen and my parents don’t know I am pregnant!’ ‘She’s just a child herself,’ we would say.”

However this situation was totally different. This pregnancy was planned. Then the wife discovered that she was pregnant with twins. What would normally be cause for great celebration—a two for one wanted pregnancy—turned out to be the source of disappointment. After the results of the pregnancy test, the couple did intense research. They embarked upon a very pragmatic course to investigate the impact on their lives of raising twins. They read various studies that pointed to a lowering of standards of living and other supposed socio-economic restrictions that come with multiple parenting. Therefore, in cold, calculated fashion, they decided upon the taking of the lives of their sixteen-week-old twins. The nurse was disgusted. She said, “At what point would someone in the industry stand up and say, ‘No! That isn’t a good enough reason to abort your baby.’” Her disgust, along with an eventual religious encounter with Jesus Christ, led her away from her job in an abortion clinic in favor of a job at the NICU of the local hospital. What a reversal!

Good news, bad news. I have given you both in this article. I will leave you with a reminder of the ultimate good news: Jesus Christ is King. He ruled from the wood of the crib. He ruled from the tree of the Cross. He rules today—everywhere. He will rule forever. When the time is right, when His plan is ripe, He will put an end to the death of the innocents who live in the womb. Praise the Lord!

Beware the Red Kettle: Catholics don't give to the Salvation Army.

As we enter stores to do our Christmas shopping occasionally we see a person ringing a bell and we see people dropping money into the red kettles of the Salvation Army. May Catholics not be among the givers! Catholics may think it is a worthy charity. It is not. The Salvation Army is a Protestant sect that opposes the Catholic Church. Why would we want to give our hard-earned money to our opponents, to those who compete with the true religion, to those who teach a distorted Gospel, quite different than the one we have been teaching for 2000 years, sowing error, confusion and division? St. Paul the Apostle warns us: *But even if we or an angel from Heaven should preach [to you] a Gospel other than the one that we preached to you, let that one be accursed! (Galatians 1:8).* Moreover, the Salvation Army favors abortion in many cases and also the evils of artificial contraception. Catholics need to be very cautious about which “charities” to give to, whether on-line, at the cash register, or at the ring-a-ling-a-ling of the red kettle. Generosity is a good thing, under the right circumstances, but the Apostle reminds us that we should be especially solicitous about being charitable to our own Catholic Church. He says that certainly we are to do good, but *especially to those who belong to the family of faith. (Galatians 6:10).*
