### NOTE FROM THE PASTOR:

#### Dear Parishioners:

Father Vincent was a young priest in the first years of the seventeenth century. One day he was sailing in a ship in the Mediterranean Sea when three Turkish vessels, filled with pirates, pursued them. After a fervent fight, in which all the men on Vincent's ship were either killed or wounded, the French ship was captured and brought to Tunis in North Africa. The Turks fastened chains around the necks of the prisoners and marched them to the marketplace, where they were exhibited for sale as slaves. They were carefully inspected by the dealers, who looked at their teeth, felt their muscles, made them run and walk, with loads and without, to determine if they were in good condition. Then the men were put up for sale.

Father Vincent was eventually sold to a Frenchman who had abandoned the Catholic faith for the Mohammedan religion. This man had three wives who were very kind to the poor priest. One of them would go out to the fields where Vincent was working and ask him questions about France and about the Church. His answers seemed to impress her profoundly, and one day she asked him to sing to her one of the songs that Frenchmen would sing in praise of their God. The request brought tears to Vincent's eyes. He thought of the Israelites who were enslaved in Babylon in the sixth century B.C, and of their answer to a similar demand by their pagan captors. With an aching heart he intoned Psalm 137:

By the rivers of Babylon there we sat weeping when we remembered Zion. On the poplars in its midst we hung up our harps. For there our captors asked us for the words of a song; our tormentors, for joy: "Sing for us a song of Zion!" But how could we sing a song of the LORD in a foreign land?

Father Vincent sang other Catholic hymns at her request, including the "Hail, Holy Queen." That night the woman spoke to her husband and said to him, "There is something wonderful in that religion." Her words penetrated her husband's heart and stirred something within him. With the invisible and mysterious aid of God's grace he would eventually renounce Islam and leave Tunis secretly, with Vincent at his side. The two escaped the grip of the Sultan and made their way to France. The apostate returned to the true religion in his native land. Fr. Vincent continued his priestly journey in life and did great things for the Lord. His full name is Saint Vincent de Paul. Whenever Islam is in the news today it is usually connected to a sad story about terrorism. Recently, I read a blog on the internet that featured Islam, and, yes, terrorism was mentioned, but the story was rather upbeat.

National Catholic Register, 17 November 2017.) Father Mitch Pacwa was interviewed for the article. He is considered an expert on the Middle East. He claims that we are in a time of the first ever mass conversions of Muslims to Christianity. Consequently, Islamic leaders are frightened and are using terror to discourage defections. But this has produced the unintended result that more and more Muslims are growing disgusted with Islam. The violence of Islamic terrorists has made for bad PR, according to Pacwa. For instance, he quoted someone on African TV saying, "Al-Qaida attacks Americans by blowing up our embassies but we Africans are the ones that die in the attacks." Pacwa suspects that Islam is at the beginning of a collapse, likening increased terrorism to the supernova stage where stars burn brightest just before they burn out. However, it is not easy to leave the Muslim religion. Pacwa gave recent examples of brutal retribution for rejecting Islam. "Not long ago I read about a boy who was a slave that snuck out to pray on Good Friday and was crucified for it," he said. "I also heard about two Filipino maids that were caught with the New Testament and beheaded." Yet, despite such risks, Pacwa said that mass conversions are happening even in very fundamentalist countries.

How are so many conversions taking place in oppressive countries where proselytizing can bring a death sentence? "A large number of Muslims are receiving visions of Jesus and the Blessed Virgin Mary that has led them to convert," Pacwa said. "Many of these stories can be seen online." Another big source of conversions, according to Father Pacwa, is through Father Peter (Butros) Zakariam, a Coptic priest exiled from Egypt. He does a TV show every Friday, which is broadcast to 60 million Arabs, and a six-hour internet discussion show every Tuesday and Thursday. There are also many videos on the internet of him boldly proclaiming Christianity and denouncing Islam. Father Peter is known as "the most wanted man in the Muslim world." Pacwa explains, "The Muslims have a price on his head—\$60 million. He's in hiding but moves around. He keeps producing these TV shows and attacks Islam because he is brilliant in his knowledge of the Ouran and he is fearless."

It seems that more and more Muslims today are finding out what we Catholics have known for two thousand years: there is something wonderful in our religion. Something? Better to say, "Someone"—
Jesus, the light of the world, the hope of humanity.
