## NOTE FROM THE PASTOR

Dear Parishioners,

Kent Haruf is the author of *Benediction*, a novel set in the plains of Colorado. The main character is “Dad” Lewis. As he lay dying he expresses tender affection to a young girl who visited him. The incident generates an exchange with Lorraine, his middle-aged daughter. She asks him:

“Did you touch me like that when I was little?” He stared at her for a long time. “I don’t think so.” She asked, “Why didn’t you?” He responded, “I was too busy. I wasn’t paying attention.” “No,” she said. “You weren’t.” She lifted his hand to her cheek now. “Forgive me,” he whispered. “I missed a lot of things. I could have done better. I always loved you.” “You never told me that when I was her age,” she said. “Can you forgive that too?” he asked. “Yes, Daddy.” she answered. “I want to tell you now,” he said. She watched him, his watery eyes staring at her. “I loved you,” he whispered. “I always did. I approved of you completely. I do today.” She kissed his hand and puit it back on his chest and leaned far over and kissed him on his cracked lips. “Thank you, Daddy. I feel the same way. I hope you know that.”

Often I tell children, in front of parents, that they are good. Often the parent will reply by saying something like, “Occasionally” or “When he wants to be!” On such an occasion I feel that the parent is misunderstanding me. I don’t mean that the child is without fault. I don’t mean that the child is not downright annoying at times. I mean that God created the child good and beautiful and that in spite of the occasional misbehavior of the child, he or she is nonetheless good and beautiful—all the time. The need to hear that because being a child can be discouraging since the world in which they live is primarily for adults. Moreover their own clumsiness as they navigate life can be daunting. We do dwell to remind our children that they are good and beautiful. We do well to explicitly state to our children, like Dad Lewis, that we

approve of them completely (and drive them here and there to Confession on Saturday when the need atonement).

That parenthetical point is important. Why? Because besides affirming their children, one of the primary tasks of the parent is instilling in their children the fear of the Lord. Throughout the Scriptures we are told that the fear of the Lord is the path to wisdom and fulfillment. It’s not a servile fear, but a fear of offending the good Lord because of love.

A woman I know had a wayward son who experienced a profound conversion. Everything changed for him as he found that the love of Christ was the key to happiness in this life (and the next). She noticed that following his religious conversion he was so much easier to get along with. His attitude and actions were much more respectful and kind. As she pondered over the great difference between her son’s former selfish ways and his newfound life in Christ, she said to him wistfully one day, “That was the one mistake I made in raising you. I did not instill in you the fear of the Lord.” She was a very good mother who loved her son very much. However, she felt that she should have taught him to better respect God’s authority over us.

Perhaps teaching our children to better respect God’s authority, while at the same time affirming them as good and beautiful (all the time), is something to cultivate this Lent.

### **Lenten Regulations:**

1. Lent is a special season of prayer, penance and Christian charity.
2. Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of abstinence from meat as well as fasting, allowing only one full meal.
3. The other Fridays of Lent are also days of abstinence from meat. The obligation of fasting on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday obliges all Catholics ages 21-59. The obligation of abstinence obliges all Catholics from age 14 onward. Those whose health would be impaired are excused from physical mortifications.
4. The Fridays outside of Lent remain days of abstinence from meat. Other acts of penance such as temperance, personal prayer, daily Mass and self denial may be substituted for abstinence.
