NOTE FROM THE PASTOR:

Dear Parishioners:

I visited the eighth grade classroom recently at Sacred Heart School. The students had read somewhere that the Catholic Church was deeply at fault for what took place during the Inquisition and so they asked for an explanation. I appealed to a very good book entitled: *Bearing False Witness: Debunking Centuries of Anti-Catholic History* (2016). In this work, the author, Rodney Stark, tells us in his introduction that he did not set out to write such a book, but that in the course of writing several other history books he kept encountering serious distortions rooted in “obvious anti-Catholicism.” Stark is not a Catholic. He did not write the book in defense of the Church. “I wrote it in defense of history,” he said.

The Spanish Inquisition was created in 1478 by the king and queen of Spain: Ferdinand and Isabella. It was charged with ridding the nation of heretics, especially Jews and Muslims who were pretending to be Christians. Not only historians, but novelists, painters, and screenwriters have repeatedly re-created scenes of horrible Inquisitorial sadism, from Edgar Allen Poe’s “The Pit and the Pendulum” (1842) to Dostoyevsky in *The Brothers Karamazov* (1880).

How many victims were there? Estimates range from 10,000 to 3 million. But, as Stark makes clear, “The standard account of the Spanish Inquisition is mostly a pack of lies, invented and spread by English and Dutch propagandists in the sixteenth century during their wars with Spain and repeated ever after ... by malicious or misled historians.” It is not surprising that such lies flourished during Europe’s era of religious wars following the Protestant Revolt. Stark points out that there has been remarkable research on the Inquisition during the last generation. As a result we can be confident, he states, that “In contrast with the secular courts all across Europe, the Spanish Inquisition was a consistent force for justice,

restraint, due process, and enlightenment.”

The careful records of the archives of the Spanish Inquisition indicate that there were 44,674 cases heard between 1540 and 1700. During that time only 826 people were executed, at a time when capital punishment was quite common in society. That amounts to 1.8% of all cases brought to trial. During the subsequent century (1530-1630) the Protestant English averaged 750 hangings per year, many of them for minor thefts. In contrast, the few who were sentenced to death in Spain were usually repeat offenders who would not repent. All of the courts of Europe used torture but the Inquisition used it far less than the other courts.

I concluded the presentation to the eighth graders by saying that as Catholics, we are to humbly assent to the teachings of Jesus Christ that He passes on to us from generation to generation. There is no room for skepticism there. On the other hand, it is important that we employ critical thinking in other areas outside of settled Christian doctrine. When it comes to historians’ attempts to piece together what happened through the centuries we should certainly ask ourselves where certain historical claims are coming from and what is behind the claim. Very often, seriously misled scholars dominate the narrative and the truth lies elsewhere
