NOTE FROM THE PASTOR:

Dear Parishioners:

It was April 18, 2017. Father Samuel Okwuidegbe, a Nigerian Jesuit, was leaving his home around noon. He had just spoken to his provincial, Fr. Chuks Afiawari, who made a joke saying, "Make sure where you are going they don't kidnap you." They both laughed. On the drive he heard sporadic gunshots. "On glancing back I saw all the vehicles behind me stopping and trying to reverse. That's when it hit me that there was something dangerous ahead of me. On looking up I saw masked men with AK47 rifles shooting. I was so scared. I stopped my car abruptly and began to reverse, but as I was trying to do that a man suddenly appeared." That man told Fr. Samuel to get out of the car or he would shoot. He surrendered and came out.

They were Muslim Fulani from the northern part of Nigeria. They forced him and two other men through a path in the bush for eight hours. While on the trek through the forest, they let one of the kidnapped men go because he was sickly and could not keep up with the pace. The kidnappers were agitated that he was slowing them down. They even deliberated on killing him at one point. Fr. Samuel began asking himself, "Is this happening to me? This can't be happening to me, God. Why? Why God?"

Next came torture. They did not believe that he was a priest. They asked for his phone but he had left it in the car. They removed his cassock and tied his hands and feet behind him. Then they threw him into the dirt and began to beat him with the back of their guns, kick him hard in his ribs, slap him across the face and drag him across the ground. Then they brought a cloth close to his nose. He could smell paraffin. One of them said, "We are going to burn you alive!" He believed it. He began to pray in silence: "God, I commit to You my spirit." That night he wondered how much longer he would be alive and prayed the Rosary and the Divine Mercy Chaplet. He kept humming the refrain to a Catholic hymn that gave him comfort. As he stared at his bruises and deep welts he hoped for a miracle.

The next day they went to a different place in the afternoon. The captors kept coming to Fr. Samuel to ask if he had a phone number to give them so that they could begin the ransom process. However, like most cell-phone owners these days he no longer bothered to remember numbers. He would speed dial to make his calls. They were not pleased with this explanation and so they slapped him each time he failed to give a number. Meanwhile the other man had managed to contact his brothers, and they were negotiating. Fr.

Samuel then begged his captors to go on the internet and look up the Jesuit website and find a phone number. At first they seemed afraid to be tracked and so they refused, but then they reconsidered. They got the phone number of the provincial and began the negotiations.

Meanwhile, hunger and thirst started to overwhelm him. The Fulani left some water for the captives but he chose not to drink it out of fear of getting sick from contaminants. He began to be tempted to despair. He prayed for death. But then he had consoling thoughts that word must have reached others about his capture and, as a result, the sisters at the retreat center where he worked would be praying for him. This gave him hope.

On Friday, money was delivered and they were released around 8 PM. They left the kidnappers and began walking without knowing where they were going in the pitch black, through farms where there were traps and vigilantes watching out for intruders, and then through a forest with dangerous animals. They finally came to a home after about an hour. They heard a woman's voice. Fr. Samuel said, "Please, we need help, we had just been kidnapped." The moment she heard kidnapped, she became alarmed and said, "Let me call my 'Oga' (my husband)." The other man said, "Madam could we please get some water to drink? We are very thirsty." That request touched her, and so she came out with her husband. After the water was served the two men began to cry. When their friends and family reached them there was great relief. Fr. Samuel recalls, "I began to feel the pains now, all the torturous moments at the forest came flooding over me. I sobbed uncontrollably... my pain, exhaustion and fear...with relief, with joy, but also with deep sadness at the thought of where we had just been."

When Father Samuel got home he received calls from all over the world. Crowds flocked to see him at his parish. People reached out to him who had not spoken to him in years. Family and friends came and asked, "Fr. Sam, are you okay?" Yes, he would answer. It was a miracle. "This experience was painful and traumatizing, but it has renewed my faith in God and my faith in people." He said his ordeal has led to his being "more than ever encouraged" to help others who suffer.

Jesus brings good out of the trials and tribulations that we suffer. Praise the Lord!
