NOTE FROM THE PASTOR:

Dear Parishioners:

Will Storr wrote a very interesting article entitled: “It was Quasi-Religious: The Great Self Esteem Con.” [The Guardian.com, June 3, 2017.]. Storr describes the history of the society-wide emphasis, or over emphasis—as he would see it, on self-esteem. He writes, “The flawed yet infectious notion that, in order to thrive, people need to be treated with unconditional positivity first gained traction in the late 80s. Since then, the self-esteem movement has helped transform the way we raise our children – prioritizing their feelings of self-worth, telling them they are special and amazing, and cocooning them from everyday consequences.”

One of the effects of this movement may involve grades and awards in school. According to Storr, in the US, between the late 60s and 2004, the proportion of first year university students claiming an A average in high school rose from 18% to 48%, despite the fact that SAT scores had actually fallen. Keith Campbell, professor of psychology at the University of Georgia, argues that fourteenth place ribbons, like one his daughter once received, and the thinking behind it, has led to a rise in narcissism.

Where did this emphasis on self-esteem come from? It started with John “Vasco” Vasconcellos. In 1986, the Democrat California state lawmaker, Vasco, managed to persuade a deeply skeptical Republican governor to fund a three-year task force to study the value of self-esteem. The final report came out and the findings were described publicly as “very positive and compelling.” Our nation bought into the report. A movement that was first seen by many as ridiculous was now embraced. Political leaders from Arkansas to Hawaii began considering their own task forces. The entertainment industry and the university world applauded the findings.

The culture was radically transformed. Disciplining students in public school was often frowned upon as an affront to their self-love. Children were awarded sports trophies just for showing up. A Massachusetts school district ordered children in gym classes to skip without actual ropes lest they suffer the self-esteem catastrophe of tripping. Meanwhile, police in Michigan searching for a serial rapist instructed the public to look out for a thirty-something male with medium build and low self-esteem.

However, there was a problem—a big one. The professors of the University of California who analyzed the data presented a false conclusion to the public, according to Storr. When Storr tracked down one dissenting professor of the self-esteem task force, that professor claimed that one sentence from his private journal of the proceedings tells the story: “The news

most consistently reported is that the association between self-esteem and its expected [positive] consequences are mixed, insignificant or absent.” Why was the truth never presented? According to the professor, “The task force would welcome all kinds of good news and either ignore or deny bad news. I found this was a quasi-religious movement, and that’s the sort of thing that happens in those dynamics.”

Where does Catholicism stand on the issue of self-love? Jesus said: *Love your neighbor as you love yourself.* [Mt 22:39]. Therefore, loving yourself is important. Each of us is good and beautiful because we are made in God’s image. Each of us is more valuable than the entire material universe: all galaxies, the sun, stars, planets and animal life chains. The Son of God considers each of us so important that He was willing to die for everyone, and He did. That is good news, which inspires us to value ourselves.

On the other hand, the Church also reminds us that we are sinners. Therefore we need the Savior! As sinners we have pride, which St. Thomas Aquinas defines as “the inordinate affection against right reason by which someone esteems himself and desires to be esteemed above that which he really is.” [*Summa Theologica*]. As a result of our excessive self-esteem we are, at times, greedy, instead of grateful. Because of our pride we lose our temper. “How dare he/she do this to me!” we say. However, in our pride we forget what *we did* to Christ on Good Friday by means of our sins. As a result of our excessive self-esteem we can think we’re better than others and criticize others and harm their reputation, a reputation precious to all. *A good name is more desirable than great riches.* (Prov. 22:1). As a result of our pride, we sometimes forget that all of the good we have achieved must be credited to God. *Lord, it is you have accomplished all we have done.* [Isa 26:12]. Our successes, filtered through our bloated egos, can make us haughty and arrogant at times. We are sinners. This is bad news. However, Jesus takes away our sins. Once again, good news!

In sum, it is true to say that unlike the movement spearheaded by Vasco, we Catholics prefer a more balanced approach to the subject of self-esteem.
