NOTE FROM THE PASTOR:

Dear Parishioners:

Over time, the Church has recognized the great dignity and power of St. Joseph. In 1962, St. Joseph's name was added to the first Eucharistic prayer of the Mass. In 2013, on May 1, the feast of St. Joseph the Worker, Pope Francis had the name of St. Joseph inserted into all the other Eucharistic Prayers. I recently learned of an apparition of St. Joseph that has the Church's approval. Not all supposed apparitions are approved by the Church. That is why great caution must be employed anytime it is claimed that the good Lord, or our Lady, or the Saints have been sighted.

From 1994-1998 in Itapiranga, Brazil, St. Joseph appeared along with Mary and Jesus to 21-year-old Edson Glauber. In her messages our Blessed Mother stressed the need for penance, the Rosary, and the Holy Mass. One day, St. Joseph came with the Child Jesus who reclined on his heart. Joseph said, "Just as I am fair and righteous in the sight of God, all who have devotion to my Heart will also be chaste, righteous and holy in His sight. I will fill you with graces and virtues, making you grow every day on the road of holiness."

St. Joseph revealed a prime attack of the Devil, which has increased since 1998: "The means that he most utilizes are the sins against holy purity, because purity is one of the virtues most loved by God." We live in a time of great sensuousness and lasciviousness. Just turn on the internet or T.V.! Devotion to St. Joseph will help us with sexual temptations. This was his promise in Brazil. He also promised to furnish the dying with a holy death. He said, "I myself will be to these souls their petitioner to my Son Jesus and, together with my wife, Mary Most Holy, we will console them in their last hours here on earth with our holy presence and they will rest in the peace of our hearts."

Joseph encouraged Edson to trust in Jesus' mercy. "The enemy of salvation makes sinners think that there is no solution, nor possibility of a return to God, because they have despaired and have not trusted in divine mercy." But, St. Joseph says even to "those who have committed the most terrible sins, to trust in the love and in the forgiveness of God and to trust in me also, in my intercession. All those who trust in my intercession will certainly recover the grace and mercy of God."

Finally, St. Joseph spoke of how he would help all people with their everyday problems. He was family man who suffered great trials, such as the murderous edict of King Herod, who wished to destroy the Messiah while He was still a little boy. Joseph also experienced great poverty in Egypt. The mystics tell us that He was often exploited by his contractors in Egypt because he was a refugee. They sometimes sent him home without pay, even after an arduous day's work. The Holy Family went hungry on several occasions. St. Joseph's biggest cross of life, however, was in knowing, by divine revelation, that His beloved Son would suffer on Good Friday, but that he himself would not be there to assist Him. St. Joseph was a man well acquainted with the struggles of earthly life.

St. Joseph, pray for us here at Sacred Heart!
