NOTE FROM THE PASTOR:

Dear Parishioners:

Tomorrow is Columbus Day. According to the *Catholic Encyclopedia*, Columbus was born in Genoa about 1451. At the beginning of 1492, he wanted to find the East Indies. On his way to Cordoba, Spain, with the intention of going to France or England to get approval and financing for his proposed expedition, he reached the Dominican convent of La Rábida. He was penniless and barefoot. Columbus begged the friar who acted as door-keeper to let his tired son rest at the convent over night. A short time later, he met Father Juan Perez, the confessor of Queen Isabella, who was the wife of King Ferdinand of Spain. After providing for his immediate needs Father Perez took him to his cell, where Columbus told him all about his hopes. The result was that Father Perez hurried to the queen to discuss the proposed undertaking of the Italian navigator. She said yes. Even before his journey, we see the influence of Catholicism in the discovery of America.

The squadron with which Columbus set out on his first voyage consisted of three vessels with 120 sailors: the Niña, the Pinta, and the Santa Maria. Before leaving, Columbus and his crew received the Sacraments of Penance and Holy Eucharist. At 2 a.m. on October 12, 1492, Columbus landed on what is now called Watling's Island in the Bahamas. The discoverers named the island San Salvador, in English, Holy Savior. The island was named after Jesus. Again, we see the influence of Catholicism. On the third voyage, he would name an island after the Blessed Trinity: Trinidad. The results of the first voyage include partial recognition of the Bahamas, the discovery and exploration of a part of Cuba and the establishment of a Spanish settlement on the coast of what is now the Island of Haiti or Santo Domingo. There would be three other expeditions.

Eventually, Columbus found himself unpopular among certain factions in the lands of his discoveries, territory in which he kept power as the viceroy of King Ferdinand. There were accusations of mistreatment of the natives. Scholars debate about how much of this was to be blamed on Columbus himself, rather than his underlings in government. Anxious to be just, the queen decided to initiate an investigation into the administration of Columbus in the West Indies. The investigation was led by Francisco de Bobadilla, who landed at Santo Domingo on August 24, 1500. As *visitador* he had absolute authority to do as he thought best, especially against rebels. Since Columbus was not there when he landed, his brother Diego refused to submit to Bobadilla's authority until his brother returned. Bobadilla saw the refusal as an act of insubordination. A short time later, Columbus and

his two brothers were imprisoned. When they returned to Spain in irons the queen was indignant. Bobadilla had exceeded his authority. Columbus was set free.

A fourth voyage of exploration at the expense of the Spanish Government was conceded to Columbus. There were some misgivings in regard to his physical and mental condition at this time. By all accounts, the fourth voyage was disastrous. Violent storms continually harassed the little squadron, two ships had been lost, and the material, political and spiritual benefits of the journey were very small. From the point of view of government, Columbus had become useless due to his unpopularity. Most of the colonists would not tolerate his presence. The only practical course was to take him back to Spain directly and remove him forever from the lands the discovery of which had made him immortal. Columbus landed in Spain on November 7, 1504. He died May 20, 1506 in Valladolid, Spain.

Columbus is considered to be a man of genius, in spite of his faults. He was a bold, skillful navigator, and a man of original ideas who was persistent in carrying them out. The impression he made on those with whom he came in contact, including Queen Isabella herself, shows that he was very magnetic and persuasive. Moreover, his success in overcoming the obstacles to his expeditions show him to be a man of unflinching determination.

Columbus was also deeply religious. He never failed to insist on the conversion of the pagan peoples that he encountered. This would change the Americas forever and link millions of souls to Jesus Christ, the light of the world, and do away with morally repulsive practices prevalent on both continents before Columbus, such as cannibalism, infanticide and human sacrifice.

In short, from the Catholic perspective, Christopher Columbus seems worthy of celebration in the form of a national holiday. Happy Columbus Day!
