NOTE FROM THE PASTOR:

Dear Parishioners:

Assisted suicide was in the news twice recently—and it was good news—praise the Lord!

First, a woman who planned to die by euthanasia changed her mind after talking to Pope Francis. Consuela Cordoba, from Colombia, was injured in 2000 when her ex-boyfriend threw acid in her face. “I had perfect teeth, I was very pretty. But now, I’m destroyed,” she said in a 2012 interview. “I’ve thought about committing suicide. I say to myself, why live? With a life like the one I have, what for?” This poor woman has undergone 87 operations and needs tubes in her nostrils to breathe. She can only eat liquid food and has to wear a mesh body suit all the time.

After she was diagnosed with a brain infection recently, she and her doctor agreed to end her life on September 29. Before that date, she wrote to Pope Francis for permission to discuss the matter when he would be visiting Colombia (last week). He agreed. The two hugged. Consuela asked him to give her permission to end her life. “He said ‘no’, he was not going to do it. He told me that I was very brave and very beautiful,” she said. “That changed my life. Now I want to live. Dr. Gustavo Quinonez was going to give me the injection, but I’m not going to do it because God is going to bring greatness to my life.”

The second piece of good news is that the New York State Court of Appeals ruled September 7, 2017 to uphold the state’s law that bans physicians from providing life-ending drugs to terminally ill patients. Catholic leaders welcomed the decision. It was in part the result of the combined work of the Church together with several other advocacy groups that oppose assisted suicide. Kathleen Gallagher of the New York State Catholic Conference said, “Unanimously the court judges have said very clearly there are rational, legitimate reasons for New York’s ban on assisted suicide, and then they list them: prevention of suicide in general, the ethical integrity of the medical profession, the preservation of life—all of these

rational reasons why we have this law in place.”

Edward Mechmann, Director of Public Policy for the Archdiocese of New York, said, “It was unanimous—all the lower courts were unanimous too—they [the assisted suicide advocates] haven’t gotten a single judge in New York to agree with them.” Mechmann added, “We don’t win too many pro-life victories in New York, so this is really very good for us.” Both Gallagher and Mechmann said they anticipate that groups will continue to push for legalized assisted suicide. They also emphasized that much more needs to be done when it comes to providing education on the issue.

Mechmann said one of the biggest misconceptions about assisted suicide is that it is about alleviating the physical suffering of the dying. However, most pain can be managed with palliative care. The main reason people choose assisted suicide is that they have lost their sense of purpose and meaning in life. Moreover, they do not want to be a burden on loved ones. Mechmann argues that the solution to this suffering is not death, but the support of family and friends. He said, “It’s really what the Holy Father talks about when he talks about accompaniment—we need to assure people that their family and their community and their parish will stand with them and walk with them when the end of life approaches.”

The Holy Father practiced what he preached when he lifted up Consuela in Colombia!
