NOTE FROM THE PASTOR:

Dear Parishioners:

A priest I know is from the diocese of Orlando, Florida. One day, he took his sister out to lunch on his day off. He was not wearing his roman collar. As they drove past a store-front psychic, his sister indicated that she wanted to go in. He tried to discourage her. He told her that it was a mortal sin. She nevertheless persisted and so he decided to go in with her out of a brotherly protective instinct. A few minutes into the session the psychic said to the priest, whom she did not recognize as a priest, "I am sorry, sir. I must ask you to leave. You are causing all sorts of disturbances in here." That makes perfect sense. The psychic is in league with demons who are bewildered by the presence of a man of God.

Recently, Pope Francis sternly warned the faithful. He said, "A Christian does not have a horoscope to see the future. He doesn't go to a fortune teller with a crystal ball or have his palm read. No, no! He doesn't know where he is going. He is guided." The Holy Father was reminding us that we trust in divine providence for our future. Jesus is our king. He is in charge. We don't turn to psychics and mediums or horoscopes because that is a sin against the faith and trust we are called to have in God by virtue of the First Commandment: *Have no gods but the Lord*. The Catechism of the Catholic Church states in article 2116: "Consulting horoscopes, astrology, palm reading, interpretation of omens and lots, the phenomena of clairvoyance, and recourse to mediums all conceal a desire for power over time, history, and, in the last analysis, other human beings, as well as a wish to conciliate hidden powers. They contradict the honor, respect, and loving fear that we owe to God alone."

But, you may argue, don't these fortune tellers help people? The psychic does not help people. He or she leads others to sin. Remember what Christ said about such people: *Whoever causes one of these little ones who believe in Me to sin, it would be better for him to have a great millstone hung around his neck and to be drowned in the depths of the sea.* (Matt. 18:6). The psychic works mainly through the power of the demons. The

demons know very much about our past. Their memories are excellent. The demon will inform the psychic in her heart about intimate details of the client's life and the psychic will mention these details to the client to inspire the client with trust, and then the psychic gives a prediction about the future that is vague, and able to be fulfilled in a variety of ways. An example of such a prediction is: "You will meet someone soon who will change your life." Occasionally, the demon gives the psychic an accurate prediction to pass on to the client. They are capable of this because demons are thousands of years old and have seen the patterns of earthly existence many, many times. Sometimes they have a sense of what is coming.

With Pope Francis, I urge you to avoid fortune tellers and horoscopes and related practices. I have met several people over the course of my priesthood who have come to me struggling with evil in their own lives or in their families. After informing me that a certain darkness has entered their spiritual lives and relationships, accompanied even by strange occurrences around the house, I then ask if they have been to a psychic, a medium, a card reader, or played with a ouija board. Each time the answer was yes. This is nothing new. King Saul, who was replaced by King David, the royal prophet, once visited the witch of Endor to serve as a medium for him. (1 Sam. 28). He was dead the next day. If we are tempted with worry about the future we need not consult a fortune teller. We need only to consult Jesus—and trust Him. *Consider the generations long past and see: has anyone trusted in the Lord and been disappointed?* (Sirach 2:10).

Church in Latin America: For over fifty years the special collection for the Church in Latin America has been a special sign of solidarity between the Churches of Latin America and The U.S. People living in Latin American regions have faced many barriers to practicing their faith such as lack of resources, shortages of pastoral agents and poor infrastructures. For example in Peru great distances and deteriorated roads mean that priests must travel on foot or by mule to rural communities. This means that some rural regions are visited by priests and ministers once a month and some even twice per year. However as a result of this collection 65 pastoral ministers were trained and now the people in these locations have increased exposure to the faith. The second collection next weekend will be for The Church in Latin America and Cardinal Dolan asks that you be as generous as your means will allow.
