NOTE FROM THE PASTOR:

Dear Parishioners:

Today Mother Teresa of Calcutta will be canonized. I met her twice when I was a seminarian: once in the Bronx, once in India. As I met her in the Bronx, in the Missionaries of Charity convent on 145th Street, she smiled at me with a radiant grin and then gave me three Miraculous Medals. She was a firm believer in the power of these medals. I saved them in my home bedroom on the desk. I was convinced that one day she would be a saint and so I kept the medals with that in mind. My brother called me months later while I was at the seminary and told me that he met someone who was struggling in life and so he gave that person the three medals. He said that he hoped I would not mind. I told him, "No problem. Mother Teresa gave them to me, but they're in good hands now." He was flabbergasted! "Mother Teresa?!" he shouted. "Mother Teresa," I said. Now we will say, "Saint Teresa of Calcutta."

My favorite book about today's saint is entitled simply *Mother Teresa*, by Fr. Leo Maasburg. Fr. Leo spent several years with her when he was a young priest and so he offers wonderful stories about her that the typical biographer would not include in his or her work. He said, "I often heard her say this simple sentence: 'What you do, I cannot do. What I do, you cannot do. But together we can do something beautiful for God."

Fr. Leo remembered when Mother was going to Ethiopia as the famine was wreaking havoc on an already impoverished society. Little children came to her in Calcutta because they knew she was going to help. The Sisters had told the children how very much the children in Ethiopia were suffering. And they came and each one gave something, which amounted to very little, but whatever they had, they gave. Mother Teresa reported, "And a little boy came to me and said, I have nothing, I have no money, I have nothing. But I have this piece of

chocolate. And you give that, take that with you and you give it to the children in Ethiopia.' That little child loved with great love, because I think that was the first time that he had a piece of chocolate in his hand. And he gave it. He gave it with joy to be able to share, to remove a little of the suffering of someone in far Ethiopia. This is the joy of loving: to give until it hurts. It hurt Jesus to love us, for He died on the cross, to teach us how to love. And this is the way we too must love: until it hurts."

Although Mother Teresa did great works to help society, which brought her the Nobel Peace prize in 1979, she would have bristled if she was identified as a mere social worker. She was a woman of God and a person who centered her life in Jesus Christ. Fr. Leo points out, "In 1972 when a catastrophic flood struck Bangladesh, Mother Teresa immediately sent her Sisters there to help out. The needs were enormous, and the work demanded superhuman efforts on the part of the Sisters. So they were asked if they would make an exception and not interrupt their work for their prayer sessions. Mother Teresa decided against it: 'No, the Sisters will come home for Adoration and Holy Mass.' Many of the relief workers who had responded to the catastrophic flood did not understand, but for Mother Teresa it was clear that the Sisters' strength dries up if they are not nourished daily by Mass and their Adoration of the Holy Eucharist." St. Teresa of Calcutta, pray for us! God bless you! Father Eric

<u>Summertime!</u> A <u>great time</u> to look at some challenges before us— A growing concern/question I am often asked is "Why are many of the hymnbooks/missals in disrepair? "What is being done about this?"

A Bit of History: In 2004, The Parish Choir and I embarked on a Herculean fundraiser (via a year long concert series, including a hymnbook dedication as part of the ticket purchase). As a result of hundreds and hundreds (and hundreds!) of hours of painstaking work and great generosity from parishioners, we were able to purchase 400 hymnbooks/missals (in addition to 50 choir books thanks to a generous Parish Choir member!) - permanently replacing the need to purchase an equal number of disposable missalettes yearly!

The Good News/Bad News: The good news is we have saved the church over \$108,000 over the last 12 years by using our beloved hymnbooks, in lieu of disposable missalettes (not to mention the hundreds of trees saved in the process!). Additionally, of course, is the <u>priceless</u> devotional comfort for those who worship weekly, using the book dedicated to their loved one. The history of deceased members/family members of this parish live on in our hymnbook/missal dedications!

The Bad News: And so it is we are challenged on many levels as how best to meet the ever growing need of addressing our deteriorating books!! Approximately 1/3 of the books need serious repair and/or replacement. Book binding repairs will usually cost more than a new book (New book—approx. \$16-\$26). Additionally our edition of Journey Songs is no longer in print (due to English revision of the Mass several years ago).

So if we purchase "new", we need to purchase <u>all new books</u> (approx. \$8500)! Ideas? Checks anyone? Pamela and the Choirs (VM 24) 718-442-0058
