NOTE FROM THE PASTOR:

Dear Parishioners:

In every story there are the main characters. In today's great feast of the Epiphany we start with King Herod. Who is King Herod in the Bible? There are four. There is Herod the Great who reigned when Christ was born. His son was Herod Antipas. Herod Antipas had John the Baptist beheaded (Mt 14:1-12) because John spoke of God's law about sexual chastity and Herod's behavior was thereby condemned. John preached that only relations between a validly married man and his wife are holy. All other acts of the flesh are sinful. Herod Antipas was offended by this teaching because he was a sinner. Herod Antipas also abused our Lord during His Passion (Lk 23:7-11). He clothed Him in a white robe and mocked Him. Herod Agrippa I is the nephew of Herod the Great. He executed St. James the Apostle, brother of St. John the Evangelist (Acts 12:1-3). He also imprisoned St. Peter (Acts 12:4-7). He died suddenly and mysteriously after the crowds proclaimed that he was a god (Acts 12:20-23). Lastly, there is Herod Agrippa II. It was before him that St. Paul answered Jewish accusations when Paul was prisoner in Caesarea (Acts 25:23).

It was Herod the Great who was involved in the events of the Epiphany. He was the son of non-Jewish parents. They called him great not because he was great in virtue, but great in power. He was an Edomite, which means he was related to Esau. As you recall, Isaac, the son of Abraham, had two twin sons: Jacob, also called Israel, and Esau. Strictly speaking, Herod, therefore, was not a true Jew from the racial point of view. This is important because on his death bed, Jacob predicted to his sons that the Messiah, the Christ, would be a descendent of Judah, son of Jacob. (Gen 49). In fact, that is why we call the children of Israel "Jews."

Jacob also prophesied that the Christ would be born when someone outside the race of Judah would serve as king. Herod matches this description. Hence, the prophecy was fulfilled. Herod was appointed King of the Jews by the Roman Senate in 40 BC to replace the collapsing dynasty of the Jewish priestly rulers. He was very friendly with the pagan Romans. He was a consummate politician. He rebuilt the Temple on a grand scale. Unfortunately, Herod was notorious for his cruelty. He killed over half of his ten wives, some of his children and many well-known people. Knowing how unpopular he was because of his brutality, Herod ordered an entire village to be slaughtered at the moment of his death. Why? So that at least some people would be mourning when he died.

Who are the other main characters of the Epiphany? The Three Kings, also called the Three Magi, or Three Wise Men. They were astronomers who studied the heavens. Astronomy is good. Astrology and horoscopes are evil. By putting our trust in horoscopes or card readers or psychics, instead of putting our trust in God's love for us, we violate the First Commandment. The word 'Magi' comes from a Hebrew word hagah, which means to meditate. How else are we to become wise except by meditating on the Word of God? The Wise Men meditated on the Word of God from their home in Arabia near the Euphrates River (modern Iraq). They are descendents of Abraham not through Isaac, the son of Abraham's wife Sarah, but through Ishmael, the son of

Abraham's slave Hagar.

The Magi remembered the prophecy of Balaam, in the Book of Numbers (24:17) which had announced the coming of the Messiah by the sign of a star (Num 24:17). Balaam predicted: A star shall come forth out of Jacob, and a scepter shall rise out of Israel. Herod the Edomite knew the prophecy too. That is why he was so troubled at the appearance of the star because he knew that the same oracle foretold disaster for his family. The Scripture says that with the coming of the Messiah Edom shall be dispossessed (24:18). St. Augustine says, "If [Christ's] birth as an infant makes proud kings tremble, what will His tribunal as [the Universal] Judge do? Let princes fear Him sitting at the right hand of His Father, whom this impious king feared while He hanged yet on His mother's breast. [Catena Aurea, MT 69.]

There is another character in the story that we should mention: the star. This was a very unusual star. Normally, stars are located in the firmament. This one was down here in our atmosphere. Stars are light years away from us. What is a light year? It is the amount of distance light travels in a year. Light travels 186,000 miles per second, 16 billion miles a day, about 6 trillion miles a year. If you boarded a space ship to travel to the nearest star in the night sky you would die of old age before you reached that star. But this star was different. It was very close to the earth.

Other stars have a circular motion from our vantage point here below. This star traveled in a straight line. It went before the Magi in their journey from Arabia to Judea. Other stars shine only at night. This one shined in the day as well. Other stars keep shining for centuries and centuries. This star was temporary. It continued only during the period of the Wise Men's journey from Christmas, on the 25th of December, to January 6th, the day of the Epiphany, 13 days later. This star sometimes hid itself. When the Magi went forward, it went forward. When they rested, it rested. It stood over the house where Christ was. Then, when its work was accomplished, it vanished. The pillar of cloud by day and the pillar of fire by night led the Israelites out of slavery in Egypt to the promised land in the time of Moses. It was a foreshadowing of this star, which led the gentiles out of slavery to their false beliefs into the light of Christ's truth.

In the famous scene from the Gospel where the disciples forbid children from approaching Christ, the Lord Jesus says: Let the children come to me and do not hinder them for the Kingdom of God belongs to such as these. (Matthew 19:14). One of those children was Saint Ignatius of Antioch who died a few years after St. John the Apostle. St. Ignatius knew all about this star because he lived around the time of its coming. He wrote: "The star shone so as to surpass in brightness all other stars. Its light was indescribable. Its newness struck all with amazement. All the rest of the stars together with the sun and moon were a kind of chorus for that star."

What did that star do? It led others to Christ. That is what you and I do. Think of all the times you and I have led others to Jesus. What a privilege!
